Responses to Inquiries Request for Expressions of Interest

1. **Inquiry:** Telegraph Hill is primarily a building project and considering that the NICET certifications are primarily used for highway work, will the Authority accept equipment of vertical construction experience in lieu of a PE or NICET IV for the Resident Engineer?

Response: Yes, equivalent experience will be considered.

2. **Inquiry:** Will the Authority accept the equivalent of vertical construction experience in lieu of a NICET III for the Inspector?

Response: Yes, equivalent experience will be considered.

3. **Inquiry:** Will the Authority accept the equivalent of vertical construction experience in lieu of a NICET IV for the Inspector/Office Engineer?

Response: Yes, equivalent experience will be considered.

4. **Inquiry:** Section R under the "Duties of the Resident Engineer" states that the Resident Engineer will perform tests required to ensure material compliance with the Plans and Specifications. Is this to be included in the Consultant's SOW in addition to the man-hours shown in Section 5, Staffing Estimate?

Response: The intent of Section R is for the Resident Engineer to perform some of the tests to ensure material compliance, as appropriate. Remaining testing services shall be performed under Item No. 13 for direct expenses for specialized testing services.

5. **Inquiry:** Will the Authority accept an employee with the Certified Construction Manager (CCM) designation having more than the 10 years of related project management experience in lieu of the NJ Professional Engineer requirement for the Project Manager position, as noted? The CCM designation is a professional certification managed by the Construction Management Association of America (CMAA). It is normally recognized and accepted by many public agencies.

Response: No, as stated in Item No. 2, the Project Manager shall be a Professional Engineer Licensed in the State of New Jersey.
