

The Secretary to the Authority reported that ten days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, have elapsed since Governor Philip D. Murphy received the proceedings of the regular meeting of January 29, 2019; he did not exercise his power to veto any items in those minutes.

Upon motion made by Treasurer DuPont seconded by Commissioner Diaz the minutes of the meeting was unanimously approved.

PUBLIC COMMENT

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Victoria Thornes

Ms. Thornes advised she has been working at the Turnpike Authority as a Toll Collector for approximately 8 years and works as a Part-Time Toll Collector at Exit 14. Thornes said she is grateful that Local 194 and the Turnpike negotiated a pay increase to \$15 per hour and that the extra pay in her paycheck helped her family with her bills. Thornes also said Part-Time Toll Collectors were promised back pay for all of the years they didn't have a contract and the workers were counting on the back pay to take care of their families. Thornes stated it would be helpful for the retro pay that was promised. Thornes said the Union and the Turnpike worked very hard to negotiate a fair deal for them and they have waited since 2011. Thornes said the old administration cut their pay to try and work things out and the new contract felt like a new day with work changing for the better. Thornes stated part timers only received half of what they were promised and that she was here today on behalf of other part timers to respectfully let the Commissioners know that things are tough and they are still waiting for their back pay and urged them to hold up their end of the bargain.

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Michele Shuberda

Ms. Shuberda said she has been working with the NJTA since June 25th of 2011 as a 16hour Part Time Toll Collector working other shifts when asked. Shuberda said she works a second job as a teacher to make ends meet. Shuberda noted she started a full-time position as a Toll Collector in August 2018 at which time she resigned from her teaching position and said it was an easy decision because she enjoys working on the Turnpike meeting and greeting people each and every day. Shuberda advised she was excited to hear about the 2018 agreement between Local 194 and the Turnpike mostly because she was ecstatic to be receiving a raise after so long of going without one and noted, like most of us, trying to live off of your salary is hard to do when you haven't received a raise in 7 years and the cost of living goes up and your pay check doesn't. Shuberda said they were also promised back pay for the years they went without a raise. Shuberda stated she was planning on using the money to get caught up on her bills and Christmas has passed and the bills are piling up. Shuberda said although she is a little better off now than she was since receiving her raise, she was counting on the back pay to help her family budget. Shuberda stated she is speaking on behalf of herself and the other Part Time Toll Collectors and asked the Turnpike to honor the agreement that was signed in August of 2018 between Local 194 and the Turnpike. Shuberda said she hopes we will be able to resolve this issue and move forward.

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Donna M. Lee

Ms. Lee advised she has been employed by NJTA since March of 2016 as a 16-hour Part Time Toll Collector in the Southern Division. Lee advised although her classification is a 16-hour Part Time Toll Collector she often works upwards of 92 hours per week. Lee said in October of 2018 she became a Full Time Toll Collector and loves her job. Lee advised she has been called the "Queen of the South" for taking on extra shifts. Lee advised she was also happy that Local 194 and the Turnpike reached a contract agreement in the fall of 2018. Lee advised the raises were retro-active for a few years back and she was counting on the money to catch up on bills, however, that back pay has not come yet. Lee advised she was here today to ask respectfully for the Turnpike to hold up their end of the deal for the Part-Time employees on the Turnpike. Lee thanked the Commissioners for their time and the opportunity to speak to them.

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Barry Kushnir, President of IFPTE Local 194

Kushnir advised he represents approximately 1000 employees on the New Jersey Turnpike, 700 full time and approximately 300 Part-Time employees. Kushnir said after 27 years on the job it is a very proud moment that he could stand here and have the opportunity to speak to those who changed the way we worked. Kushnir stated we negotiated a salary increase in 2018 which was trendsetting, \$15 per hour minimum wage for our lowest paid workers and noted this was a progressive policy that was ahead of the curve. Kushnir stated the raise in minimum wage is coming down the line in the state and he is very proud, but that is not going to happen until 2024. Kushnir stated the Unions and the Authority took only 6 months to accomplish that momentous feat and that we should all be proud. Kushnir stated he receives many phone calls from the 300 employees and they have questions and don't understand how things are going right now. Kushnir said he is proud of all who came out to represent themselves today, and hopes we could try to accomplish our goals by working together, and this was just the first step.

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR COMMENTS

Executive Director Keller said he is pleased to announce that at today's meeting we are proposing the first phase of the Authority's compliance efforts of the Diane B. Allen Equal Pay Act. Keller stated representatives from many departments were involved in the process, that was led by our Human Resources and Law Departments, with support from our General Counsel DeCotiis.

Keller further stated today represented just the start of the process and in the coming months we hope to complete the evaluation of all NJTA employees. Keller also noted all adjustments will be retroactive to July 1, 2018.

Keller commended the efforts taken to date by all those involved in systematically

undertaking this very complex multi-tiered review, applying statutory and objective criteria and standards, to address the requirements of the Act.

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DIRECTOR OF HUMAN RESOURCES COMMENTS

Director of Human Resources Mary Elizabeth Garrity explained today's roster of personnel actions also includes adjustments for the first group of employees evaluated for compliance with the NJ Equal Pay Act. This comprehensive multi-tiered review effort will continue until all NJTA employees are appropriately evaluated. The adjustments were recommended by the NJTA's EPA Review Committee, in consultation with the Law and Human Resources Departments, General Counsel Decotiis and the Governor's Authorities Unit. All final recommendations will include retroactivity for any adjusted sums to July of 2018.

On motion by Treasurer DuPont and seconded by Commissioner Diaz employment of those named to serve at the pleasure of the Authority and other recommended personnel actions, were approved, ratified and confirmed, to become effective as of the dates specified and at the salaries listed.

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Director of Law Robert Carroll requested approval of item numbers 042-02-2019 through 046-02-2019. Moved is the items as follows:

042-02-2019

In a memorandum dated February 8, 2019, <u>Authorization to renew Excess Liability</u> <u>Insurance, and Public Officials and Employment Practices Liability Insurance for one</u> <u>additional year and Excess Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability Insurance for</u> <u>a three-year term, RM-147390, Budget Code: 10-893-441010, Amount: not to</u> <u>exceed \$2,639,409.00</u>, was approved.

The Authority maintains Excess Liability insurance, Public Officials and Employment Practices Liability insurance policies, and Excess Workers' Compensation and Employers Liability insurance, all of which will expire on March 15, 2019.

WillisTowersWatson ("Willis"), the broker of record for these lines of insurance, sought renewal quotations for each of the coverages indicated above. The quotations were reviewed by staff and with the Authority's insurance and risk management consultant, Hanover Stone Partners, LLP ("Hanover Stone"). Following discussion and analysis, it is recommended that each of the insurance coverages be renewed as follows:

(1) <u>Excess Liability Insurance – (Self-Insured General Liability and Automobile</u> <u>Liability Insurance Program) (March 15, 2019 to March 15, 2020)</u>

The Authority maintains \$100 million of Excess Liability Insurance above its \$2 million self-insured retention ("SIR") for General Liability claims and its \$5 million SIR for Automobile Liability claims. The Excess Liability insurance has traditionally been structured in four (4) layers of \$25 million each.

Willis marketed the program with over (20) carriers seeking renewal quotations for coverage on the first \$25 million layer of the program, requesting the same terms and conditions as the current policies. A number of carriers declined to quote due to their lack of appetite for this type risk; other carriers reviewed the risk and advised that their quote would not be competitive with the current program. No carrier, including the incumbent, was willing to write the full \$25 million primary layer.

Willis was successful in achieving a renewal of the program with the following insurers at the following premium amounts, which includes all applicable state taxes and surcharges:

The above total premium reflects an increase of 11.6% from the current premium. It is recommended that the Authority renew the Excess Liability Program with the underwriters and in the amounts set forth above, for a total aggregate premium, including New Jersey Property

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Liability Insurance Guaranty Association ("PLIGA") and New Jersey Excess & Surplus lines taxes in a total amount not to exceed \$947,183.

(2) <u>Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance (March 15, 2019 to March 15,</u> 2022)

The Authority maintains Excess Workers' Compensation insurance (Statutory) and Employers Liability insurance (\$2,000,000 each accident and each employee for disease) with a SIR of \$1,250,000, with Safety National Insurance Company ("Safety National") that will expire on March 15, 2019. Willis was asked to solicit renewal quotations for this line. Three (3) carriers, Safety National, Arch Insurance Company, and Chubb/ACE Insurance Company, provided quotations for renewal. It is recommended that coverage be renewed with Safety National, at a rate of \$0.2660 per \$100.00 of payroll, for an initial annual premium of \$449,642, which represents a decrease of 29.6% from Safety National's current annual premium and includes a guaranteed rate for the three-year policy period and Terrorism Risk Insurance Act ("TRIA") coverage. It is recommended that the Commissioners authorize renewal coverage to be bound as set forth above in an amount not to exceed \$449,642 for each year of the three (3) year term, for a total three year amount not to exceed \$1,348,926, subject to audit at the end of the policy period.

(3) Public Officials and Employment Practices Liability Insurance

(March 15, 2019 to March 15, 2020)

The Authority maintains Public Officials and Employment Practices Liability Insurance with National Union Fire Insurance Company of Pittsburgh, PA ("AIG") with a limit of \$20 million, along with an excess policy with Ironshore Indemnity Inc. ("Ironshore") that provides an additional \$10 million aggregate and limit, both of which will expire on March 15, 2019.

Willis approached a number of underwriters for renewal quotations for coverage with the same terms and conditions as set forth in the current policies. Willis provided two alternative quotations from other underwriters for the primary layer which were not competitive with the incumbent.

After much negotiation, AIG agreed to improve upon its proposed renewal policy form. While not as comprehensive as the expiring policy, AIG has agreed to coverage extensions not otherwise available from other underwriters. With respect to the primary layer, AIG quoted a renewal premium of \$260,928, which is the same as the current premium, and which would result in a mandatory PLIGA surcharge not to exceed \$1,566 resulting in a total premium amount of \$262,494. With respect to the excess layer, Ironshore quoted a renewal premium of \$80,806, an increase of 5% from the current policy, and which includes the mandatory PLIGA surcharge. Willis was directed to continue negotiations with Ironshore to further reduce the quoted premium. It is recommended that the Authority renew the Public Officials and Employment Practices Liability insurance with the underwriters and in the amounts set forth above, for a total aggregate

premium, including PLIGA, not to exceed \$343,300, a small increase from the current policy premium.

It is therefore requested that the Commissioners authorize the Executive Director to renew the insurance policies and coverages as outlined above. It is further requested that the Commissioners authorize the Executive Director to take all such actions and to execute all such documents, after review by Hanover Stone, and with the recommendation of the Law Department, to effectuate the authority set forth above.

In a memorandum dated February 7, 2019, <u>Ratification of Action Taken and</u> <u>Authorization for the Transfer of Property Interests in connection with the New Jersey</u> <u>Turnpike Authority, Garden State Parkway Interchange 67 Improvement Project</u>, was approved.

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority undertook an interchange improvement project at Interchange 67 on the Garden State Parkway to provide better access to and from the Garden State Parkway and local roadways (the "Project"). Access to and egress from the Parkway was improved with the addition of a southbound entrance ramp and a northbound exit ramp, in coordination with other improvements in the area completed by Ocean County.

Pursuant to former New Jersey Highway Authority Resolution 2001-8, the Authority's Commissioners authorized the Executive Director to enter into an agreement with Ocean County and to acquire all necessary right-of-way for the project. Pursuant to agenda item 71-07, a Supplemental Agreement was authorized and in 2008, a second supplemental agreement was authorized by Agenda item 106-08.

Construction of the Project was completed in 2011 and maintenance and jurisdictional agreements have been negotiated and executed. The following property interests, which are located on or in the area of West Bay Avenue, a County Road, now need to be transferred to Ocean County, at no cost to Ocean County. Ocean County has agreed to accept these properties:

Parcel 11 - Tract 1 - Fee Simple - 1.1629 acres

Parcel 11 - Tract 2 - Utility Easement - 0.0036 Acre easement

Parcel 12 - Tract 1 - Fee Simple - 0.5015 acres

Parcel 12 - Tract 2 - Traffic Signal Easement - 0.0277 acres

Accordingly, it is requested that the Authority's Commissioners authorize the Executive Director, with the assistance of the Law Department and outside counsel, to effectuate the above transfers as described above. In a memorandum dated February 7, 2019, <u>Ratification of Action Taken and</u> <u>Authorization for the Transfer of Property Interests in connection with the New Jersey</u> <u>Turnpike Authority, Garden State Parkway Interchange 69 Improvement Project</u>, was approved.

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority undertook an interchange improvement project at Interchanges 69 on the Garden State Parkway to provide better access to and from the Garden State Parkway and local roadways (the "Project"). Access to and egress from the Parkway were improved with the addition of a northbound entrance ramp and a southbound exit ramp and the widening of Waretown/Wells Mills Road, Ocean County Route 520.

Pursuant to former New Jersey Highway Authority Resolutions 97-182 and 2001-8, the Authority's Commissioners authorized the Executive Director to enter into an agreement with Ocean County to improve Interchange 69 and to acquire all necessary right-of-way for the Project. Pursuant to agenda item 101-05, in 2005, the Commissioners authorized the Executive Director to enter into a Supplemental Agreement with Ocean County for the widening and improving of Waretown/Wells Mills Road and two (2) bridges over the Parkway at Interchange 69.

Construction on the Project was completed in 2008 and maintenance and jurisdictional agreements have been negotiated and executed. The following property interests, which are located along Waretown/Wells Mills Road/County Road 520, now need to be conveyed to Ocean County, at no cost to Ocean County. Ocean County has agreed to accept these properties:

- Parcel 1 Tract 1 Fee Simple 0.0766 acres
- Parcel 2 Fee Simple 0.0666 acres.
- Parcel 3 Tract 2 Fee Simple 0.0604 acres.
- Parcel 4 Fee Simple 0.2387 acres
- Parcel 5 Tract 1 Fee Simple 0.0223 acres.
- Parcel 5 Tract 2 Utility Easement 0.0028 acres.

Accordingly, it is requested that the Authority's Commissioners authorize the Executive Director, with the assistance of the Law Department and outside counsel, to effectuate the above transfers as described above. 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In a memorandum dated February 8, 2019, <u>Ratification of Settlement with and</u> <u>Release of Reliance National Insurance Company (In liquidation) ("Reliance") regarding</u> <u>various open legacy workers' compensation claims, Amount: \$3,997,708.60</u>, was approved.

Reliance National Insurance Company provided the New Jersey Turnpike Authority (the "Authority") with Excess Workers' Compensation coverage from 1/21/1993 to 1/20/1999, which provided reimbursement to the Authority for claim expenses that exceeded \$250,000 per claim. In 2001, the Commonwealth Court of Pennsylvania (the "Court") ordered Reliance National Insurance Company into liquidation. Reliance in Liquidation is in the final stages of its liquidation and is required to resolve all open and closed claims. With respect to all open and claims, the Court has authorized a distribution amount for all claims, representing ninety two percent (92%) of each allowed claim amount, for the twelve (12) open claims, as follows:

It is possible that as liquidation of Reliance nears completion, the Authority can potentially receive the remaining 8% of the approved distribution amount for each open and closed claim, so additional payments may be forthcoming, making the total return to the Authority as high as \$3,997,708.60. However, since the Court-ordered liquidation would mandate the monetary settlement above, ratification is only sought for the release of Reliance, an insurance company in liquidation.

The Authority reviewed this matter with its third-party administrator that administered these claims and the Authority's insurance and risk management consultant, both of whom recommended entering into the settlement and release. The Human Resource Department and Law Department concurred with the consultants' recommendations.

Therefore, it is recommended that the Authority's Commissioners authorize, ratify and confirm in all respects the settlement of this matter and release of all claims as set forth above. It is also recommended that the Authority's Commissioners authorize the Executive Director to

In a memorandum dated February 5, 2019, <u>Authorization to Settle Formal Workers'</u> <u>Compensation Matter – Leon Valentino v. New Jersey Turnpike Authority, Budget</u> <u>Code: 10-870-405070, Amount: \$107,896.11</u>, was approved.

Petitioner Leon Valentino was a Parkway Division Maintenance Person General, hired June 1987 and retired effective August 1, 2016 with a PERS Ordinary Disability retirement. This recommended settlement will resolve four (4) formal Claim Petitions, filed in 2006, 2011, 2013 and 2016.

The petitioner is represented by Petro, Cohen & Matarazzo, located in Northfield, NJ. The Authority is defended by Special Counsel Claire Y. Ringel, Esq. of Capehart & Scatchard, P.A., located in Mt. Laurel, NJ. The matter is venued in the district office of Atlantic City before the Honorable Judge Carmine Tagliatella.

The total settlement award is \$107,896.11.

The Law Department has reviewed this matter and agrees with the recommendation of the Special Counsel, the Authority's third-party workers' compensation administrator and the Authority's Benefits Manager. Authorization is, therefore, requested to allow Special Counsel to settle this matter for the sum of **\$107,896.11**.

On motion by Commissioner Pocino and seconded by Commissioner Diaz the Board unanimously approved item numbers 042-02-2019 through 046-02-2019 and authorized or ratified, as presented, the recommendations contained therein; and received and filed the memoranda.

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In a document dated February 1, 2019, <u>Recommendation to Award Contract No.</u> <u>T100.412, New Jersey Turnpike, Ferreira Construction Co., Inc., Bridge Repairs and</u> <u>Resurfacing, Milepost 0 to 92 and the Pearl Harbor Memorial Turnpike Extension (2019),</u> <u>RM-146810, Budget Code: 030C10001E, Funding Allocation: \$7,500,000.00 FY 2019,</u> <u>\$996,269.00 FY 2020, Amount: \$8,496,269.00</u>, was approved.

This is the second of two Turnpike bridge repair contracts to be awarded for the 2019 construction season. The contract is concentrated in the southern portion of the Turnpike and will perform work on 16 structures. Additional bids were received from H.A. DeHart & Son, Inc. ("DeHart") of Thorofare, NJ (\$269,985.00), and LoRe Sweeping Co., Inc. ("LoRe") of Passaic, NJ (\$293,350.00). These bidders, however, took numerous significant exceptions to the Specifications. For examples, DeHart bid a unit with a 5 cubic-yard hopper versus the 5.4 cubic-yard hopper specified resulting in 7.4% less capacity, a 3% shorter main broom than specified and has an aluminum hood versus the specified steel hood. The side brooms of the proposed unit has 6.9% less extension length than specified. LoRe bid a unit with a 300-gallon water tank versus the 360-gallon water tank specified resulting in 16.6% less water tank capacity. In addition, LoRe failed to include required information regarding the engine horsepower and torque of the unit proposed. Consequently, Maintenance Staff was unable to fully evaluate its sweeper and deemed LoRe's bid incomplete. Thus, it is recommended that the bids submitted by both DeHart and LoRe be rejected.



In a memorandum dated February 26, 2019, <u>Diane B. Allen Equal Pay Act Compliance</u> <u>Status Report</u>, was accepted.

This memorandum is submitted to confirm the applied methodology and report upon the progress of the Authority's considerable efforts to ensure compliance with the Diane B. Allen NJ Equal Pay Act ("EPA"). Over the past five months, the Authority has been conducting a detailed and comprehensive evaluation of all NJTA employee compensation levels to determine if there are any employees who are in a protected class and who are performing substantially similar work when compared to employees who are not in a protected classification and paid at a different compensation level¹. This effort to evaluate the NJTA workforce to assure compliance with the EPA has been performed by members of the NJTA HR and Law Departments in conjunction with the Authority Executives and General Counsel, the DeCotiis Firm.

Review Methodology Summary

The assigned personnel conducted this review pursuant to a multi-tiered evaluation process. First, the total workforce was divided into two respective phases. The first, identified as Phase 1, focused upon those Union Aligned and Non-Aligned administrative personnel primarily populating the NJTA HQ and working or supporting administrative, supervisory or managerial functions and a certain number of field supervisors with a total number of approximately 300 employees. Phase 2 would be composed of the remaining workforce, the vast majority of which are Union aligned personnel assigned to the maintenance, operations and field supervision duties. This latter Phase 2 category contained approximately 1675 employees distributed throughout New Jersey. These "aligned" personnel were, for the most part, subject to existing Collective Bargaining Agreements ("CBAs") which specified the negotiated terms of compensation as well as identifying the steps for compensation progression in the organization. Two review committees were formed, one for the initial demographic review of the entire workforce and the second committee to review those employees who were initially identified as warranting additional evaluation. Individual files were prepared from HR files to assure accuracy

of relevant factors affecting compensation history. Additionally, as a predicate to this project, the HR Department also mandated each NJTA Department to update its respective Job Descriptions.

After this multi-tiered review, a list was forwarded to the NJTA HR Department which then considered the identified subjects and further evaluated any perceived compensation differentials in light of the EPA criteria and objectives. This list was then reviewed yet again by the Deputy Executive Director, the Directors of the Law and HR Departments, again in conjunction with the General Counsel. From these reviews, a final Phase 1 list of recommended salary adjustments was developed, and which reflected approximately 18 subjects. This final list is to be forwarded to the NJTA Executive Director whose authorization is needed for submission to the NJTA Board of Commissioners for final approval of the adjustments. It should also be noted that these salary adjustment recommendations are provided to achieve the EPA's objective of essential parity of compensation for comparable employees performing substantially similar work and which do not portray any of the EPA exceptions.


It is noteworthy that this multi-tiered process did not reveal evidence of any NJTA affirmative or intentional discrimination of any employee in a protective classification, but instead, produced a short list of individuals whose salary differentials needed to be corrected as these subjects were found to be performing substantially similar work, objectively justifying such adjustment. Indeed, the aforementioned complex review effort strived to avoid adding subjectivity to the analysis, instead seeking to utilize objective standards for the comparisons. The final list of recommended salary adjustments utilizes a core objective of an average base salary that was determined after considering all similarly functioning employees in a similar category, determining the average between the highest and lowest compensated, and where appropriate, further adjust for previously earned longevity pay. The recommendations also include retroactive compensation of any adjusted salary sums to July of 2018, the effective date for the EPA.

The above methodology is continuing and will be utilized in the ongoing Phase 2 evaluations and where necessary is available for any remaining Phase 1 subjects that may require additional comparative review. After completion of the Phase 2 group and to ensure ongoing compliance with the EPA, continued monitoring will occur, and periodic status reports will be provided to the Board.

¹ In pertinent part, the NJ statute states: For an employer to pay any of its employees who is a member of a protected class at a rate of compensation, including benefits, which is less than the rate paid by the employer to employees who are not members of the protected class for substantially similar work, when viewed as a composite of skill, effort and responsibility. An employer who is paying a rate of compensation in violation of this subsection shall not reduce the rate of compensation of any employee in order to comply with is subsection. An employer may pay a different rate of compensation only if the employer demonstrates that the differential is made pursuant to a seniority system, a merit system, or the employer demonstrates: (1) That the differential is based on one or more legitimate, bona fide factors other than [sex] the characteristics of members of the protected class, such as training, education experience, or the quantity or quality of production; (2) That the factor or factors are not based on, and do not perpetuate, a [sex based] differential in compensation based on sex or any other characteristic of members of a protected class; (3) That each of the factors is applied reasonably; (4) That one of more of the factors account for the entire wage differential; and (5) That the factors are job-related with respect to the position in question and based on a legitimate business necessity. A factor based on business necessity shall not apply if it is demonstrated that there are alternative business practices that would serve the same business purpose without producing the wage differential.
