

Vice Chair Diaz called the meeting of the Authority's Board of Commissioners (the Board) into session in the Executive Boardroom of the Authority's Headquarters Building at 1 Turnpike Plaza in Woodbridge, New Jersey, at 9:00 A.M.

The motion was made by Commissioner Gravino and seconded by Commissioner Salermo and, after the voice vote, the motion was duly adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority.

Executive Session was adjourned at 9:38 a.m. A motion was made by Treasurer DuPont and seconded by Commissioner Salermo to resume the public portion of the meeting at 9:40 a.m.

The Secretary to the Authority reported that ten days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays, have elapsed since Governor Philip D. Murphy received the proceedings of the regular meeting of April 26, 2022; he did not exercise his power to veto any items in those minutes.

Upon motion made by Treasurer DuPont seconded by Commissioner Gravino the minutes of the meeting was unanimously approved.

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RECUSALS

The Secretary to the Authority reported recusals or abstentions submitted for the record: No recusals noted

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PUBLIC COMMENT (in Person)

John Reichman, Empower NJ

Mr. Reichman is an Attorney who wants to discuss the petition he mailed to the Authority demanding the Authority halt the highway expansion plan and noted the adoption of a strategy to reduce greenhouse gases by 50% is required by E.O. 274. Mr. Reichman remarked the expansion ignores history, community opposition and investments in public transportation. Mr. Reichman wanted answers to a statement made by the DOT Commissioner at the Senate Budget Committee that said there were no widenings of the interstate planned.

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Murray Bodin

Mr. Bodin said we live in a world of distracted driving. Mr. Bodin said that the roads have to be marked correctly. Mr. Bodin said someone has to ask the Governor to replace the current Commissioner of Transportation and the leadership of the Turnpike if they are unwilling to revise the roadway striping.

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PUBLIC COMMENT (remote by tele-conference) ooo0ooo

Matt Bewley, Jersey City Resident and NJ Sierra Club Transportation Committee

Mr. Bewley said he is here to reiterate his opposition to the highway expansion plan, it is harmful to our health and environment. Mr. Bewley said they wholeheartedly support the petition filed by Empower NJ to hold the Authority to the Governors own commitment on climate and environmental justice. Mr. Bewley suggested the Commissioners visit Grand Street in Jersey City where the expansion will occur.

Brian Scanlon, Condominium Owner

Mr. Scanlon said he wants to state his objection to any expansion to any approach to the Holland tunnel, Mr. Scanlon said it will simply result in more traffic. Mr. Scanlon said he supports repairing roads and bridges. Mr. Scanlon said the Authority should move Executive Session to after the Board Meeting for public participation.

Julie Ann Ferrara, Concerned Citizen from Perth Amboy

Ms. Ferrara said she returned to the State and as she approached the eastern edge of the State she could see a thick cloud of gray. Ms. Ferrara said she started becoming violently ill with a rash because of the air quality. This is a bigger part of an environmental picture and is our current reality. What are we doing here? Ms. Ferrara said just say no to projects that are not working and invest time and energy into a healthy and habitable present and sustainable quality of life.

Barry Kushnir, President of Hudson County Central Labor Council and Bayonne Resident

Mr. Kushnir supports the 4.7 billion Infrastructure Plan, this creates good paying union jobs and improves the flow of commercial traffic. Mr. Kushnir said this dual truss bridge is the

same bridge that fell into the Mississippi River in Minnesota over 10 years ago and as President Biden announced an infrastructure spending plan a similar bridge fell in Pittsburgh. Mr. Kushnir said the traffic has been there for decades and unless we rebuild and expand this bridge it could create a catastrophe that would impact the health and safety of people that live and commute on those roads.

Robert Howley, Jersey City Resident

Mr. Howley is against the expansion plan. Mr. Howley said he supports repairs to maintain safety. Mr. Howley further stated this plan goes against the Governors order for reduction in greenhouse gas levels.

Chris Adair, Bike Hoboken

Ms. Adair opposes the expansion of the New Jersey Turnpike Extension. Ms. Adair said this will create added car traffic and increase air pollution. Ms. Adair said we need to spend money on giving people efficient reliable alternatives.

Jovan Woods

Mr. Woods asked why the Turnpike Authority does not post all the jobs online.

Gary Murphy, Jersey City Resident

Mr. Murphy said he is against this roadway expansion proposal and is an advocate for more creative solutions to a more climate friendly way to move people in and out of our region.

Tina Whitehouse

Ms. Whitehouse is in opposition to the expansion. Ms. Whitehouse said the public would like to know the status of the expansion project.

Colin Devries, Jersey City Resident

Mr. Devries is opposed to the expansion plan. Mr. Devries said highway expansions never fix a long-term problem. Mr. Devries said the best way to reduce traffic is to build public transportation alternatives.

Raphael Wakefield, Jersey City Resident

Mr. Wakefield said this expansion is a disaster in the making. Mr. Wakefield said this is the most densely populated state in the country, so we can be assured the expansion of any highway will enable more car traffic. Mr. Wakefield asked to please halt the expansion.

Ashley Swigget, Jersey City Resident

Ms. Swigget is opposed to the highway expansion, Ms. Swigget said this project is simply prioritizing the car driving population from the suburbs over the residents of Jersey City.

Jill Aquino, Sussex County New Jersey

Ms. Aquino said she is a Pediatric, Psychiatric and Environmental Health Nurse who represents the Alliance of Nurses for a Healthy Environment, Sussex County NJ Sierra Club, NJ League of Conservation Voters and Community Coordinator for NYU Medical School. Ms. Aquino is deeply opposed to the expansion plan through the heart of Jersey City. Ms. Aquino fully

supports the petition filed by Empower NJ.

Adam Amir, Jersey City Attorney

Mr. Amir opposes the highway expansion. Mr. Amir feels the widening is misguided and understudied. Mr. Amir feels this plan will not help traffic because the ultimate bottlenecks remain at the Holland Tunnel and New York and Jersey City's cramped urban streets. Mr. Amir said this will encourage cars and increase tailpipe emissions and particulate matter in the air. Mr. Amir further stated this could increase vehicle fatalities. Mr. Amir asked the Authority to look at other ways to improve the State.

Tim Sevener, NJ Association of Rail Passengers

Mr. Sevener echoed the earlier speakers supporting public transportation as opposed to highway expansion. Mr. Sevener supported options for more electric rail options which have zero pollution.

Doug O'Malley, Director of Environment New Jersey and Steering Member Empower NJ

Mr. O'Malley advised he supports Empower NJ who filed rulemaking petitions with the Turnpike Authority documenting the failure of the Agency to take action on the directives from Governor Murphy to reduce carbon emissions. Mr. O'Malley wanted to note that expanded highways are a detriment to air quality as well as carbon pollution.

Elaina Little, President of Harsimus Cove Association

Ms. Little said her community would be directly impacted by the Turnpike's widening of the extension. Ms. Little further stated her association supports making the necessary repairs but opposes widening. Ms. Little noted the widening would increase air pollution in the community from exhaust and particulate matter from tires and brakes.

Nancy Pokler, Jersey City Resident

Ms. Pokler said she does not support spending 4.7 billion dollars to expand the Turnpike Extension through Jersey City. Ms. Pokler said the expansion will create a bottleneck at the Holland Tunnel and increase air pollution and noise that will directly impact the daily lives of residents. Ms. Pokler said she opposes the widening and urges the Authority consider the health of children who live or go to school near the Turnpike extension. Ms. Pokler further noted we need investments in expanding public transit and she supports repairing the extension.

Evelyn Chan

Ms. Chan opposes the highway expansion in Jersey City. Ms. Chan noted that the Expansion would have a direct negative impact to Public School 5 and Mary Benson Park.

Dennis Yi

Mr. Yi opposes the Highway expansion. Mr. Yi said the focus should be on getting people where they want using public transportation and supporting biking and walkable mixed use neighborhoods.

Dana Patten, Jersey City Resident

Ms. Patten said her zip code is made up of more than 80% people of color and yet continuously projects are done in her neighborhood that cause more and more pollution. Ms. Patten further noted the schools in these neighborhoods affected by the widening have more than 80% children of color. Ms. Patten said she doesn't understand that if the Governor truly cares about both environmental causes as well as social justices, why he would support this project. Ms. Patten said she supports repairing the existing roadways and bridges.

Larry Engelstein, Montclair Resident

Mr. Engelstein noted he opposes any further expenditures on highway expansion. Mr. Engelstein continued by saying this is bad transportation policy for the State as a whole. Mr. Engelstein further noted that mass transit is a heavily unionized sector that provides decent wages and jobs and we should not simply continue to promote highway expansion as a way to promote good jobs. Mr. Engelstein further stated he would prefer if the Authority does the Executive Session at the end of the meeting, so the public can more easily participate.

Charlie Kratovil, Central Jersey Food and Water Watch

Mr. Kratovil said he is concerned about the issue of air quality and expanding highways is not the way to improve it. Mr. Kratovil said vehicles are large contributors to smog in New Jersey, and these pollutants disproportionately harm communities of color. Mr. Kratovil asked the Board to reject the plans for the expansion and address the questions about statements made at the Budget hearing.

James Lee, Jersey City

Mr. Lee said he fully supports the Empower NJ Petition opposing highway expansion.

Mr. Lee said he is also opposing the exacerbation of road safety issues from cut through traffic that already causes problems for Jersey City. Mr. Lee questioned the goals of the Authority and requested the Authority support busses and railways to build a sustainable future.

John Tumino, Tumino's Towing and VP Garden State Towing Assoc.

Mr. Tumino asked for relief with fuel surcharges on towing and road service rates. Mr. Tumino advised most of the other roadways are allowing a fuel surcharge including the State Police. Mr. Tumino further noted that he was told there was provisions in the contract for an emergency and Mr. Tumino said he would consider this an emergency. Mr. Tumino requested the Turnpike reimburse the towers expeditiously.

David Pringle, Clean Water Action and Empower NJ

Mr. Pringle said he is a long-time commuter and said we should not be expanding the extension. Mr. Pringle asked if the Chair was still on the line and Chair Gutierrez-Scaccetti advised she was listening. Mr. Pringle said that he heard at the Chair's Senate Budget Hearing testimony she said that there were not highway expansions on the Interstate, when the Hudson

County Extension is an Interstate. Mr. Pringle further asked how when the Governor signed an Executive Order saying we have a few years to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, that we don't have to do anything tomorrow. Mr. Pringle urges the Authority to adhere to environmental justice, reduced demand, Governor's clean energy orders, health and invest in mass transit.

Matt Goldman

Mr. Goldman opposes the widening project. Mr. Goldman said if you want to eliminate truck traffic on the roads, widening the Turnpike is not going to help. Mr. Goldman said the Authority should be expanding rail access for freight and passengers.

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EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR COMMENTS

Executive Director Keller said we are losing 3 exceptional employees this month with a combined 109 years of public service. Deputy Director of Internal Audit Tracy Walters, Senior Emergency Services Supervisor John Sutcliffe, and Chief Engineer Robert Fischer. Mr. Keller noted that all 3 are dedicated professionals who are leaving behind of record of accomplishment and a lot of friends.

Mr. Keller continued to say Tracey Walters was hired by the New Jersey Highway Authority in 1988 as an Accountant and had worked her way to the position of Comptroller during her 24 years in the Finance Department. Mr. Keller noted Tracey was very involved with the Garden State Arts Foundation and its Board. Mr. Keller said Tracey has been the Deputy Director of Internal Audit for the past 10 years and she will be remembered by her colleagues for her hard work and her friendly personality. Mr. Keller concluded with stating you didn't often see Tracey around the building without a smile on her face.

Mr. Keller advised John Sutcliff came to work at the Turnpike Authority as a Maintenance Worker in 1985. Mr. Keller said John spent time in every division during his 18 years in the Maintenance Department, including working as a Line Striper, Equipment Operator and Assistant Foreman. Mr. Keller said in 2003 John moved to the Operations Department as an Emergency Services Supervisor and two years later was promoted to Manager. Mr. Keller noted that in this role John really flourished. Mr. Keller noted that if you ever sat in traffic because of an overturned tractor-trailer that spilled its load on the Turnpike, John is the guy you wanted supervising the scene. Mr. Keller added no matter how bad the accident was there was a comfort level hearing Director of Operations Dunn say, "don't worry Sut is on the scene".

Finally, Mr. Keller spoke about Robert Fischer who joined the Highway Authority as a Project Engineer in 1984. Mr. Keller said he was promoted to Assistant Chief Engineer, Design in 2005 and to Chief Engineer in 2014. Mr. Keller added Rob has played a key leadership role in many of the most important Capital Projects the Authority has undertaken in the past several decades and noted Rob was instrumental in identifying the projects in the current Long Term Capital Program, ensuring that Rob's legacy at the Turnpike Authority will endure long past his



retirement date.

Mr. Keller concluded by wishing Tracey, John, and Rob a long, happy, healthy retirement and he thanked them for their many years of accomplished service, their dedication to the Authority and for their friendship.

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VICE CHAIR COMMENTS

Vice Chair Diaz said it was a pleasure working with the three employees who are retiring and that those will be big shoes to fill.

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CHAIR COMMENTS

Chair Gutierrez-Scaccetti wanted to clarify that when she testifies before the Assembly Budget Committee or the Senate Budget Committee she testifies as the Commissioner of Transportation not as the Chair of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority as the New Jersey Turnpike Authority does not accept general funds or gas tax funds for the purpose of its operation, thus the New Jersey Department of Transportation has no widening planned of the Interstate system under their Jurisdiction. Chair Gutierrez-Scaccetti further noted I-78 is a designation for the Hudson County Extension and is under the jurisdiction of the New Jersey Turnpike Authority.

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COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

Commissioner Gravino wanted to congratulate Tracey Walters for all the work she did at the Authority on the Audit committee as well as all her work on the Foundation. Commissioner Gravino also addressed John Sutcliffe who is a legend and an icon and thanked him for all his hard work and always putting himself in harm's way. Commissioner Gravino also addressed Chief Engineer Robert Fischer and said he goes back the longest with Rob and wanted to thank him for all he has done.

Commissioner Minella congratulated the retirees and challenged Commissioner Gravino and said he knew Rob longer and that Rob was always a friend and always there to help, and never refused a task and we all appreciate all he did. Commissioner Minella further noted he knew John Sutcliffe since he was 14 years old, and he is a loyal family man with a long history in Jersey City. Commissioner Minella said that he knew Tracey since he has been with the Authority and she is always pleasant, always there to help, always had the answer and was always very calm. Commissioner Minella noted this is a sad day and we hate to see these employees go.

Treasurer Dupont congratulated the retirees and added that Tracey Walters was professional, educated and was a true pleasure to work with.

Acting Director of Law, Ann C. Monica, requested approval of item number 093-05-2022. Moved is the item as follows:

<u>093-05-2022</u>

In a memorandum dated May 20, 2022, <u>Authorization to Renew the Authority's</u>

<u>Property Insurance Program for Property located on the Garden State Parkway and the New Jersey Turnpike (the "Program") for One (1) Year from June 15, 2022 to June 15, 2023 upon the same terms and conditions, R-171639, Budget Code: 010-822-441030, Amount: not to exceed \$8,231,139.00, was approved.</u>

The New Jersey Turnpike Authority (the "Authority") maintains a property insurance program for the protection of its physical assets and business income (the "Program"). The Program currently insures all property on both roadways with a total insurable value ("TIV") of \$24,335,523,987 via a primary quota share \$600,000,000 layer. The primary layer is supplemented by an excess layer which provides an additional \$200,000,000 layer of coverage. The Program is subject to specified sub-limits for different categories and/or exposures and is subject to a \$2 million per occurrence deductible. Standalone terrorism coverage is provided through Lloyd's of London, which provides broader coverage than insuring Terrorism through the Federal Terrorism Risk Insurance Program Reauthorization Act (TRIPRA).

Marsh USA, Inc. ("Marsh"), the Authority's broker of record, was asked to seek quotations for a one (1) year renewal, based on a TIV that increased approximately 7.6% from the prior year.

Marsh approached the incumbent carriers and also sought out new markets. Many markets declined to quote for a variety of reasons that were specific to their individual risk appetite. Markets that did quote were evaluated by Marsh and Turner Surety and Insurance Brokerage, Inc., ("TSIB"), the Authority's insurance and risk management consultant, for price and quality of coverage.

With respect to All Risk primary layer of \$600,000,000, after review of all quotations, Marsh and TSIB recommend, and the Law Department concurs, with renewal of the program for one (1) year as follows:

With respect to the \$200,000,000 excess layer, Marsh secured a renewal quotation from Swiss Re. Based on the recommendation of Marsh and TSIB, it is recommended that this layer be renewed for an estimated \$435,631. Marsh also secured standalone terrorism coverage with a \$800,000,000 limit, with Hiscox for an estimated \$129,896, and an excess terrorism layer of \$200,000,000 with Lloyds/Lancashire for an estimated premium of \$36,284. Marsh continues to negotiate with the market to secure the most advantageous quotation for these layers of coverage.

The total premium for placement of the insurance as set forth above for the one (1) year renewal is currently estimated to be \$8,231,139, which includes an estimated \$41,728 in mandatory taxes and fees, and represents an approximate 22.46% increase in premium rate. Marsh will continue to negotiate with the underwriters for an improved premium for all layers of coverage up to the date that the renewal will become effective on June 15, 2022, as well as provide additional information so as to decrease reserves on open claims.

It is therefore recommended that the Commissioners authorize renewal and placement of the Authority's Bridge and Non-Bridge property insurance program as set forth above, for a premium total that is currently estimated to be \$8,231,139. It is further recommended that the Commissioners authorize the Executive Director to substitute or add insurance companies from those indicated above and approve other minor changes to the structure recommended above, after consultation with the Authority's Law Department, should he deem it is in the best interest of the Authority. It is further recommended that the Executive Director, after consultation with the Authority's Law Department, be authorized to execute all documents and to take any and all further actions to effectuate the renewal of the Program as indicated herein.

On motion by Treasurer DuPont and seconded by Commissioner Gravino the Board

unanimously approved item number 093-05-2022; and authorized or ratified, as presented, the recommendations contained therein; and received and filed the memoranda.

This contract will provide for the superstructure replacement of routine Turnpike Str. Nos. 98.48 and 98.76 and the superstructure strengthening of Turnpike Str. No. 98.76. The low bidder, Schiavone Construction Co. LLC has performed work for the Authority and is considered competent to complete this contract.

The scoring of the EOIs by the Review Committee resulted in the following order of ranking: 1) Dewberry Engineers Inc., 2) Jacobs Engineering Group Inc., and 3) HNTB Corporation. On April 12, 2022, Technical and sealed Fee Proposals were received from the top three firms. The Review Committee reviewed and evaluated each firm's Technical Proposal and it was determined that oral presentations would not be required. The final scoring resulted in Jacobs Engineering Group Inc. being the highest technically ranked firm. The fee submitted by Jacobs Engineering Group Inc. has been reviewed, negotiated, and is considered to be fair and reasonable for the services to be provided.

It is, therefore, recommended that Order for Professional Services No. T3948 be issued to the firm of Jacobs Engineering Group Inc. of Morristown, New Jersey, in an amount not to exceed \$6,895,000.00. This amount includes reimbursement of direct salaries times a maximum multiplier of 2.25 to cover the cost of fringe benefits, overhead and profit, plus authorized direct non-salary expenses.
